# 3-6 REPORT

This term, students in Years 3 to 6 are exploring biographies as a form of informative text. They have been learning about the structure and layout of a biography and are now beginning to investigate objective and subjective language as important language features. As part of their assessment, students will soon be writing a biography about someone they know and find interesting. To support this, a survey will be coming home shortly for students to complete with their chosen person—this might be a family member, a friend, or even someone from the local community. Students will use this information to write a biography and present it using a multimedia format.

In Mathematics, Years 3 and 4 have been focusing on partitioning numbers to add, identifying odd and even numbers, and exploring how these behave when adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing. They will soon be learning how to use estimation to make reasonable predictions in problem-solving. Years 5 and 6 are investigating prime, composite, and square numbers, as well as solving problems involving unknown values. They will also be applying estimation strategies to improve efficiency in multiplication and broader problem-solving.

We are proud of the effort students are putting into their learning this term and look forward to seeing the creativity and insight they bring to their biography projects!



### K-2 REPORT

Hello and Welcome to Week 3,

We have had such an exciting start to the term, with Cross Country and getting our *Pick of the Crop* garden set up.

In English, we have begun exploring non-fiction texts, with a focus on biographies. The Juniors began the unit by reading some different biographies and discussing the different facts they learnt from them. then looked at writing their own autobiographies using interesting facts about themselves. Now, we are breaking down biographies further by looking at the structure of a biography. These will include things like headings, subheadings, photos, and facts. I cannot wait to continue exploring and crafting our biographies with some exciting plans that are yet to come.

In Maths, we have hit the ground running with our exploration into numbers. Our Preps are investigating numbers 0-20 and working on partitioning them into two or more parts. We have been using our coloured blocks, ten frames, and MABs to do this. In Year One, we are working on partitioning single- and double-digit numbers. We have also been combining our partitioning with writing the sums to go with the partitioned numbers. This is to help students understand that all numbers are made up of smaller numbers. Our Year Twos are also investigating partitioning, but with numbers up to 1000. They are also working on their addition, subtraction, and irregular partitioning. We will begin working on more complicated word problems to challenge our Year Twos' problem-solving skills.

Our Science unit has been kicked off by the amazing Mrs Roberts! The Juniors were lucky enough to begin exploring living and non-living things with a fun scavenger hunt outside. They looked around the school and found different living plants and animals. We will look at the different changes that living things can go through from birth to adulthood. Our garden will be an excellent addition to discuss the changes that the seeds go through.

I look forward to an exciting rest of Term 2.
